

Ronald McDonald House

In 2008 ISC embarked on a partnership with Ronald McDonald House with the aim of giving something back to the community.

Through the Ronald McDonald House (RMH) in Perth, WA, ISC in conjunction with the Emirates Western Force gave the families staying in the house an opportunity to enjoy some one on one time with the team and experience something that money can't buy.

In 2010 that partnership expanded to NSW and a relationship was established with the Randwick House and two Sydney based Clubs, the Sydney Roosters and Sydney Swans.

For three games this season, two Roosters and one Swans, families from the Ronald McDonald House were invited to enjoy the game through ISC's corporate hospitality.

The families enjoyed five star treatment at the games, with a bus transfer from the House to the ground, a fully catered lunch or dinner, and access to the inner sanctum of the players, the dressing rooms, for post match celebrations.

They also received special gift packs of team merchandise from ISC to ensure they got into the spirit of the game.

But the association with RMH didn't end there. Staff of ISC also dedicated their time to supporting the families. In June they put on an Italian Night at the House where they cooked a feast and in 2011 there are many more similar events planned.

Brett Corrick, ISC CEO, said the partnership allowed the business to reflect on those things that are important to the community.

"It is important for our staff to understand the impact we can have on the community through our partnerships and the work that we do," he said.

"Our staff are encouraged to get involved in the House visits where we can go in and cook dinner. Even those events can bring a smile to a child's face."

"We are also thankful to the Club's for their support. Something as simple as watching a live game of football can brighten up their day."

Peter Schneider, Executive Officer of RMH Randwick, was equally as happy with the partnership that provided the families the opportunity to meet some of their heroes.

"In August 2009 Brett Corrick contacted us here at Randwick to gauge what interest we may have to extending this program to some of the 760 odd families who make RMH Randwick their home," he said.

"Experiences like this mean much more to our families than what they would mean to regular footy enthusiasts. Opportunities like the invitations that ISC has been offering our children and their parents bring a ray of light into their lives."
